Standing orders to the rescue!

Islington North CLP delegate, Cllr Gary "reference back" Heather gave Conference his parting shot in a point of order on Tuesday. CAC had said that the new power to refer back parts of reports would need a rule change to set out a procedure for doing so. Gary drew attention to CAC1, where CAC set out the procedure.

However, as Conference went on, different Chairs interpreted the procedure differently. Some Chairs would only allow delegates who were speaking on a motion move reference back. Other Chairs would prioritise delegates who were moving reference back. In the education debate, canny delegates were queueing up to move reference back, knowing this would get them in to speak – at the expense of other delegates who wanted to take part in the debate but did not want to move reference back.

Gary pointed out this was unfair. Fortunately, help is at hand. Islington North CLP and South Derbyshire CLP have sent rule changes to Conference this year, which will appear on next year's Conference agenda — calling for Conference to have standing orders to help all delegates join in the debate in a fair manner.

Following Monday's successful reference back on social security, yesterday Conference again asked the NPF to reconsider sections of its report, this time on health and education. Conference's new power to "refer back" is proving to be a significant improvement to party democracy.

Bad old days must never return

In 1987, as a result of the Black Sections campaign to which they belonged, history was made by the election to parliament of four Black MPs. Jeremy Corbyn referred to this when he spoke at a "diversity" event on Sunday night.

I was the organisation's national Vice Chair and Chair of Nottingham East CLP. As part of Neil Kinnock's purge of the left, four years later I was suspended from Labour on the bogus allegation of running a party within the party, which was Nottingham East's thriving Black

Section that had brought hundreds of new African Caribbean and Asian new members into the Labour Party, Corbyn-style.

At the time I was a Nottingham City Council Cabinet member. In February 1994, when my suspension was over, a new suspension was orchestrated that ended in my expulsion from the Party. Reluctantly, I took the Party to the high court, won the case after a year and was reinstated. The Party was ordered to pay £100,000 in legal costs. Those were the bad old days. Under Jeremy's enlightened leadership the mistakes of the past will not be repeated.
